

## Information on Student Presentations

On Thursday September 28 I will finish the lecture about 20 minutes early to give group members a chance to exchange contact information, and arrange their first meeting.

Grade for presentation. I will give individuals grades of "Satisfactory", "Unsatisfactory" and "No Show".

Everyone will also have the opportunity to (anonymously) grade the people in their group. The purpose of this is to reduce the temptation for people to free ride on other people's efforts. If a group member has been satisfactory or better, DO NOTHING. If you feel that a group member has let the group down (i.e., not participated to the best of their ability, or simply not shown up) send me email with the subject heading "EEP presentation grade". Tell me the group topic, and the member's name, with a grade of either "Unsatisfactory" or "No show". You can include a brief explanation for this grade, although it is not necessary to do so.

Dates: Groups 1 - 4 will present Tuesday October 31. Groups 5 - 8 will present Thursday November 2 October 31, and groups 9 - 10 will present Tuesda November 7.

Format: Each group will have 20 minutes. If you want to use a power-point presentation, send me the file the day before your presentation and I will have it ready to go. The first group will begin at 11.10, the official start of the class. I will be the "time-keeper" to start and end the class. Each group will be the time-keeper for the group that comes before it. (For example, at 11.30 it is the job of the second group for that day to tell the first group that their time is up. If they fail to do so, any delaty cuts into their time.)

Groups can use less than 20 minutes if they want. Class participation is encouraged. Each group is responsible for deciding how they want to respond to questions and comments from the class, e.g. by responding at that time, or by holding questions until the end of the presentation.
